




COMPARING PERFORMANCE OF UNIVERSAL HEALTH CARE COUNTRIES, 2016

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This year's analysis of the performance of universal health care countries has the potential to help aid policymakers in coming up with ways to improve the Canadian health care system by comparing it to other countries that have universal health care systems. This study finds that the Canadian health care system is actually the third most expensive health care systems in the OECD with its performance ranking from modest to poor due to a low availability of MRIs, a low number of doctors per capita, and long wait times.
